

# Dreamcatcher Tutorial



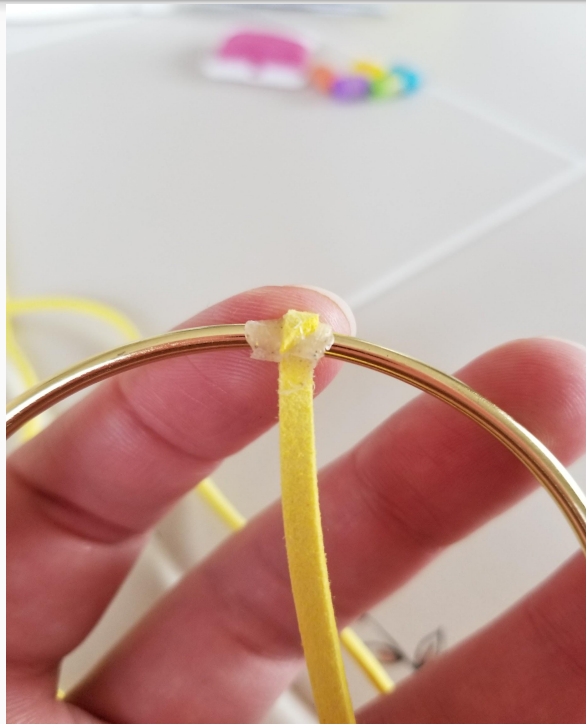
## Materials Used:

- 1) Hot glue gun
- 2) Scissors
- 3) Brass ring
- 4) Yellow suede
- 5) Thread
- 6) Beads

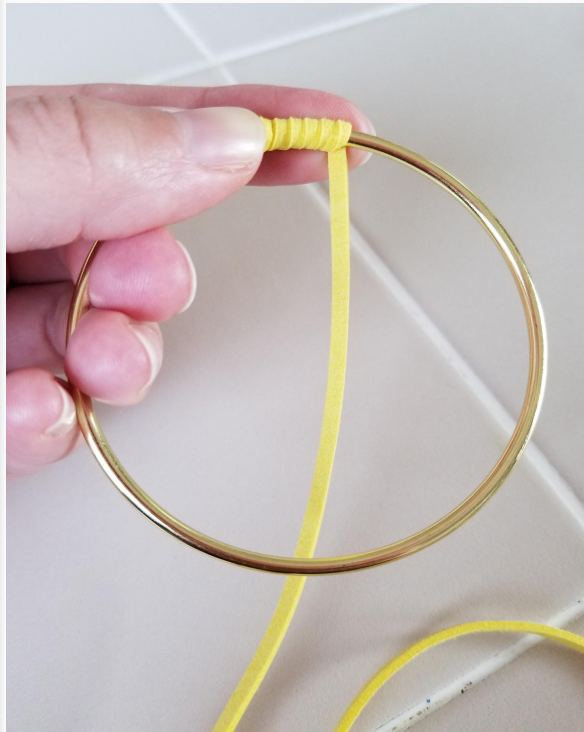


Step 1:

Glue the yellow suede to the ring



Step 2:  
Wrap the  
suede all the  
way around  
the ring, glue it  
down, and trim  
off excess  
suede.



# Step 3:

Cut about 30" (inches) of thread, and securely tie it to the ring.



Note: Always make sure your thread is on the front side of the ring when beginning each weave.



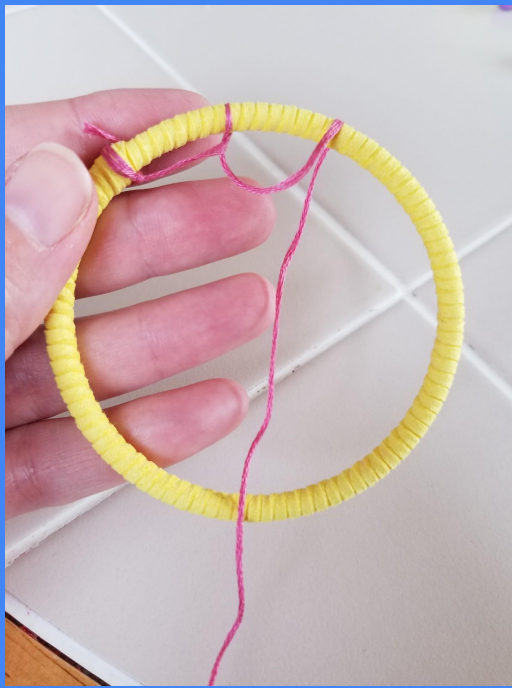
Step 4:  
Drape the thread over  
the top of the ring, and  
make sure to bring the  
thread back to the front  
side of ring.



Step 5:

Grab the end of your string, and thread it through the loop, pulling it all the way through.





Repeat steps 4 and 5 all the way around, always making sure to have your thread at the front side of the ring.



Once you have made your way around the ring, you are ready to start on the next row. This is a good time to add beads if you'd like. The process remains the same, just add a bead before you begin your weave.



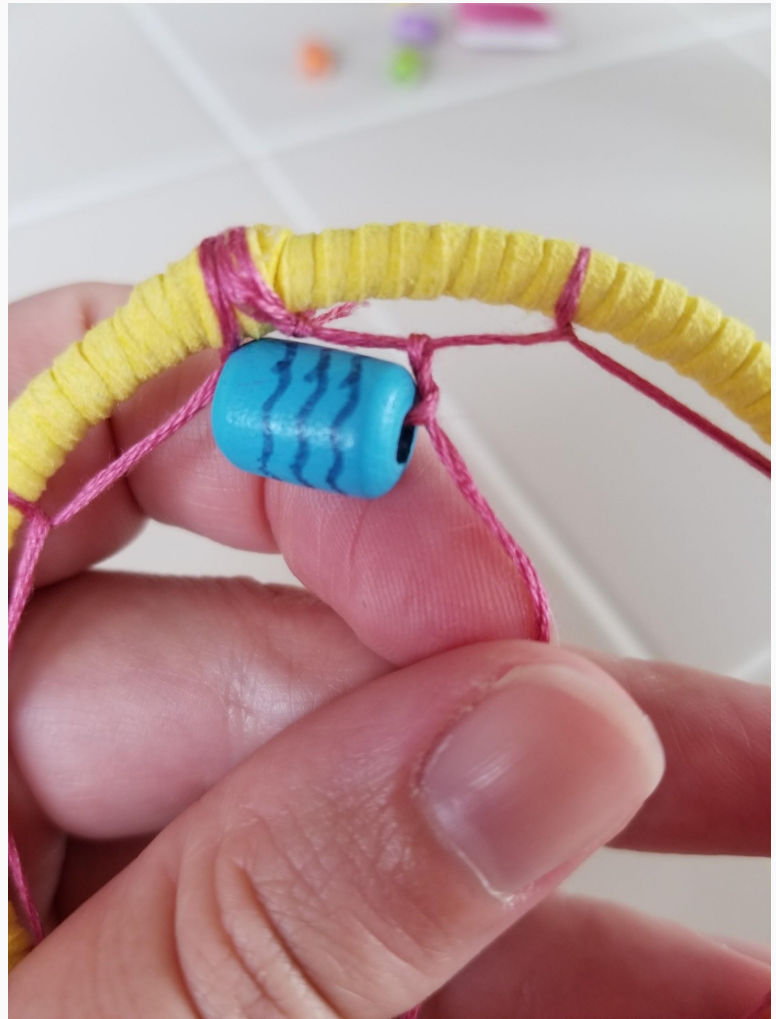
Slide a bead onto your thread, making sure your thread is always pulled to the front side of your ring.



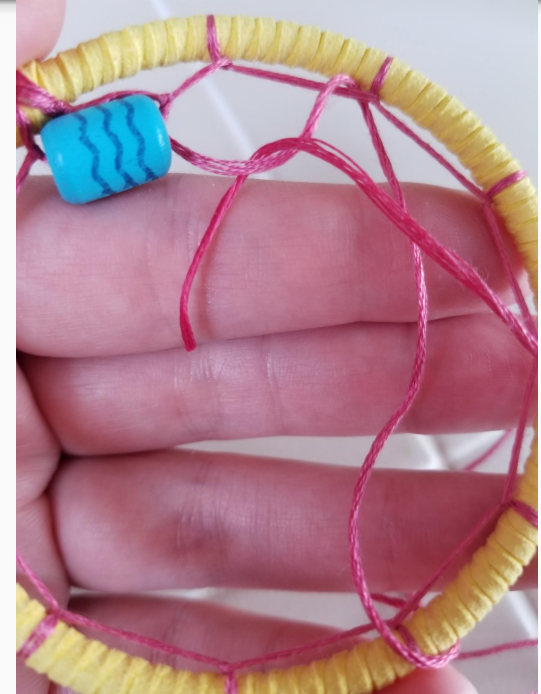
Now you begin to repeat steps 4 and 5.  
The weave remains the same throughout  
the entire web.



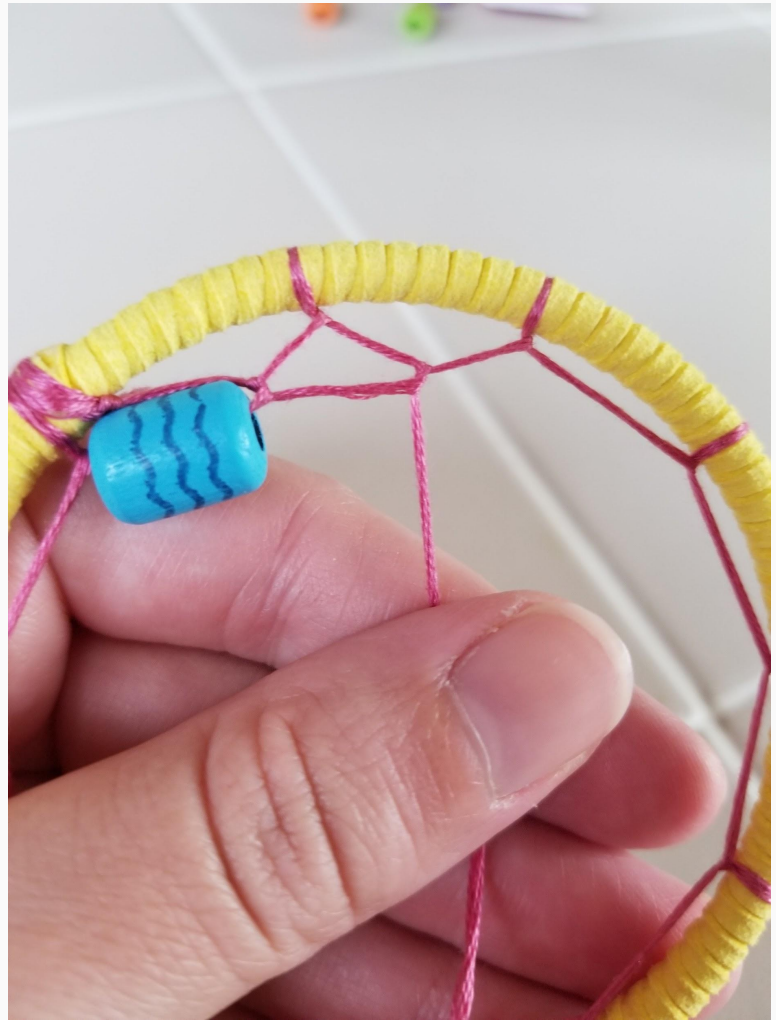
This is how it looks with the bead in place. Now you move on to the next weave. You can get creative by making patterns with the beads. In this example, I use a bead on every second weave.



Repeat steps 4 and 5, using beads where you'd like.

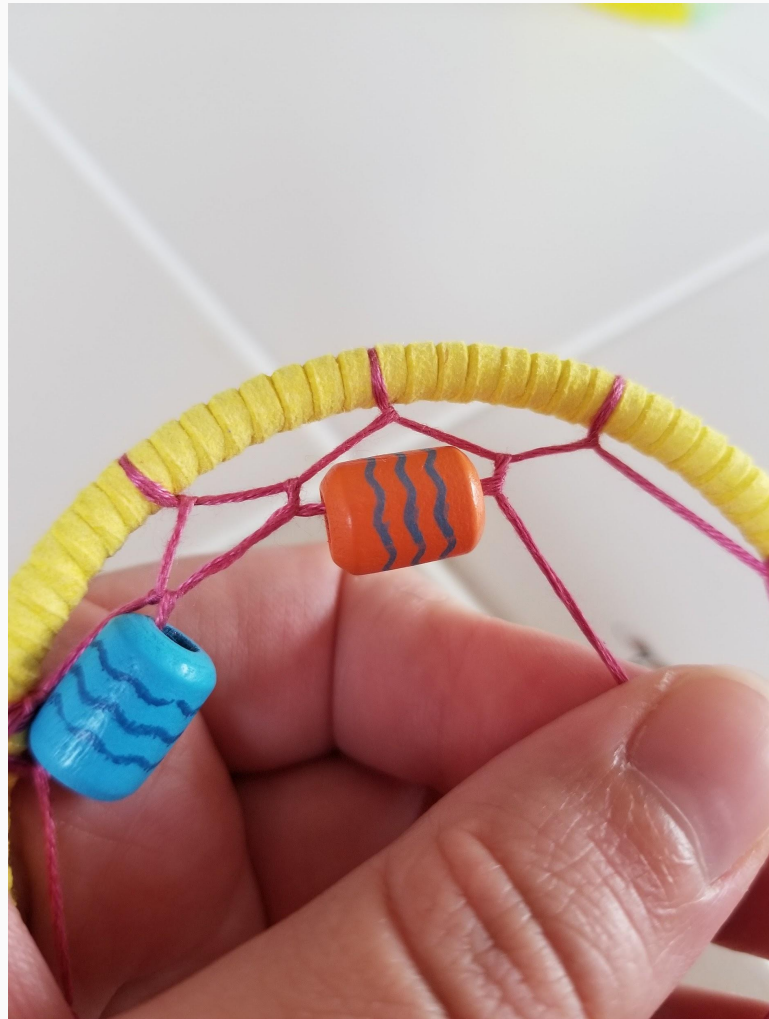


Continue with the weave all the way around. Always make sure your thread is to the front side of your ring.





Continue  
weaving  
all the way  
around









Once you've made it all the way back around, you are ready to start on the next row.



Your string  
will now sit  
to the right  
of your  
bead.  
Continue on  
with steps 4  
and 5 all the  
way around.





Continue weaving all the way around each row, until you are complete.



When you finish weaving, turn Dreamcatcher over and tie a knot or two in your thread, making sure to get it as close to your weave as possible. Trim off excess string.



Your web is now finished! Decorate with pieces of yarn, string, feathers, or crystals if you wish, and hang your finished product!
